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Mental Health Europe holds an event at the European Parliament

On 30 November, Mental Health Europe organised its annual awareness-raising event at the European Parliament, together with Mr. Milan Zver, Member of the European Parliament.

Topic of the lunch-debate was "Poverty and Mental Health in the EU: a human rights issue".

Members of the European Parliament and the European Commission participated together with other stakeholders, NGOs and representatives of MHE member organisations.

Milan Zver MEP and MHE President, Nace Kovac, gave an introduction to the debate's theme. Elizabeth Mottershaw gave a presentation on human rights as instrument to tackle poverty and Preben Brandt stressed the incidence of inequalities in the field of mental health and social services. A concrete example of good practice in Ireland was presented by Brian Howard and the activities of the European Commission, in collaboration with the "Ad hoc expert group on transition from institutional to community care", were highlighted by Jan Jarab, member of the Cabinet of EU Commissioner for Social Affaires Valdimir Spidla. Lynne Friedli moderated the final debate in which all the participants contributed very actively.

MHE NEWS AND POLICY WORK

The development and application of the monitoring mechanisms on government actions in the field of protecting the rights of the people with mental disabilities within healthcare and social institutions in Romania, Launch of the expert report, 22 October 2009

MHE was invited to participate to the launch of the monitoring report of the PHARE Project, led by the Center of Legal Resources (Centrul de Resurse Juridice) in Bucharest. The Conference aim was to present the report of experts on the situation of human rights in health care and social establishments of people with mental disabilities and people with mental health problems. Sixteen institutions were visited by some experts. A first lap of visits took place and the second monitoring visits round was focused on identifying the progress recorded by each institution during the few months elapsed between the visits. During the monitoring visits important issues such as the existence of mechanisms and procedures for complaints of people with disabilities as well as the implementation of regulations for non voluntary hospitalizations were checked. The issue of informed consent was also raised in the report as an important concern. During the Conference the experts were invited to testimony. The main issues raised by the experts were linked to the violations of human rights. The implementation of human rights legislation remains an important challenge. Some experts underlined the severe inhumane living conditions in some institutions.

The ratification of the "Optional Protocol of the Convention against Torture" of the United Nations has been ratified by Romania and put an obligation to create independent monitoring bodies in order to watch if human rights are respected by authorities in closed institutions. The importance of the civil society and the responsibility of the local authorities in the field of protection of rights have been discussed as well as the involvement of people with mental disabilities and their empowerment. The issue of legal capacity was raised and background information was presented on cases brought at the level of the European Court for Human Rights of the Council of Europe in this field.

Mental Health Europe, represented by Mary Van Dievel, MHE Director and Roselyne Bourgon, Human Rights Officer, gave a presentation on the issue of mental health and discrimination. Background information on key challenges at European level in the field of mental health was also presented.

MHE Position paper on the occasion of the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women on 25th November 2009

MHE has long-standing experience in the field of women and mental health through its activities with the aim of promoting mental health and well-being of women in Europe and to strengthen the voice of women with mental health problems in consideration of the diversity of women's experiences within the context of their own countries.

It is an established fact that women, due to the multiple roles they fulfill in society are at a greater risk of suffering mental health problem. According to the United Nation Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM), up to 70 percent of women experience physical or sexual violence from men in their lifetime. It happens everywhere, at home and at work. Violence against women and girls has sweeping consequences; it harms families and communities, impedes human development, and undermines economic growth.

MHE DAPHNE project on the mental health impacts of violence against women in the workplace is underway and already the data collected so far has illustrated the urgent need for awareness of this situation and the harmful effects harassment at work has on the woman.

MHE support to the European Parliament Written Declaration on the protection of social rights during the economic crisis

A Written Declaration on the protection of social rights when fighting against the economic crisis in the European Union was initiated in the European Parliament by the Greens, Socialist and Liberal Groups. The Written Declaration is open for signatures for the following three months, whereas the signatures of half of the MEPs are necessary for the adoption of the declaration. The bail-out plans of Central and Eastern European countries of the International Monetary Fund are linked to budgetary cuts as a condition for the granting of loans. The current crisis has a considerable impact on the mental health of the population and budgetary cuts already effected mental health service provision. Mental Health Europe therefore joined the Social Platform initiative and sent a letter to the Members of European Parliament to express its support for the Written Declaration and to urge the MEPs to sign.

Building Partnerships in Mental Health - European Social Network Seminar

On 20 November, Astrid Mechel, MHE Social Policy Officer, participated in the seminar "Building Partnerships in Mental Health for Economic and Social Integration", organised by the European Social Network (ESN) in Madrid. During the seminar which brought together ca. 70 stakeholders from governments and NGOs, the aspects of coordination of the different actors in the field of mental health were discussed and good practices were outlined, such as the cooperation between mental health and social services in Spain (Castilla-La-Mancha) and Italy (Veneto Region). Mental Health Europe's member FEAFES (the Spanish Confederation of Groupings of Families and People with Mental Illness) presented the perspective of users and their families. Other aspects that were covered during the seminar were access to housing and labour market as well as the role of the European Union in the promotion of mental health and the European Pact for Mental Health and Wellbeing.

MHE support to the Declaration from the European Disability Forum – Against the forced sterilisation of girls and women with disabilities

Women with disabilities are frequently denied control of their sexuality and reproduction and experience many different types of abuses, both individual and systemic. These abuses including forced sterilization and frequently forced abortion effectively robbing the woman of her right to decide. Forced sterilisation is usually in the form of coercion, the pressure on women with a disability to go against the health care professionals is overwhelming, if the woman decides to become pregnant, she will frequently face hostility from health professionals.

Forced sterilisation is a form of violence against women and is recognised as a crime against humanity under the treaty of Rome. Forced sterilisation is certainly not a new phenomena; the most infamous sterilization program of the 20th century took place under the Third Reich. Under the law signed by Hitler, all doctors in the Reich were required to report patients who were mentally ill with schizophrenia and bi polar disorder as well as depression, and those with a physical disability for example, epileptic, blind, deaf, or having a congenital birth defect. In 1973 the former Czechoslovakia carried out a policy of sterilization of Roma women, this was denounced as a form of genocide but this practice continued up until 1989. A 2005 report by the Czech government's independent ombudsman identified dozens of cases of coercive sterilization between 1979 and 2001.

MHE would like to remind members that this practice is still carried out surreptitiously and public awareness is low. This practice effectively dehumanizes women with physical and mental disability and is a form of gender based violence and discrimination, and although the hysterectomy of teen-aged disabled girls has been justified by the argument that menstruation is difficult to manage, we believe it is a violation of a woman's fundamental rights.

MHE fully supports the EDF declaration.

NEWS ON PROJECTS AND ACTIVITIES IN WHICH MHE IS INVOLVED

Final conference of the ProMenPol project, Berlin, 8 - 9 October 2009

Around 80 practitioners and policy makers from 26 different countries participated in the final ProMenPol conference that took place in Berlin on 8 and 9 October 2009.

The main theme of this conference was to explore the interface between policy and practice in mental health promotion bringing together people from both perspectives to allow them to exchange practical views and realities. In addition, this year's conference was joined by members of the European Network for Workplace Health Promotion, which launched a new project on mental health promotion in the workplace (*see related article at page 5-6 of this Newsletter*).

During the first conference day all participants were invited to share their ideas and experiences with respect to the concept of evidence as well as regarding relations between policy, science and practice by writing comments on pin boards which had been set up in the conference room. A great number of people made use of this option. At the end of the day the comments were integrated into a panel discussion in which those issues were lively discussed. The second conference day addressed recent EU policy initiatives in the field of mental health, with the participation of the European Commission. The newly established European Mental Health Compass Database as well as the outcomes of the EC thematic conference on the Mental Health and Well-being of Children and Young People (Stockholm, 29-30 September) were presented. Afterwards participants were divided into groups according to their setting of

interest. Workshop leaders then presented the setting specific results from the ProMenPol field trials with respect to lessons learned for practice and policy. This was used as a starting point of discussion as a means of validating the field trial results. Participants very actively contributed to the discussion and shared personal experiences from their professional and cultural backgrounds.

The New Release of the ProMenPol Database and Toolkit

The final release of the ProMenPol toolkit and database has now been made on the project website.

The ProMenPol toolkit consists of 4 inter-related manuals on how to implement mental health promotion: a generic manual on implementing mental health promotion; a manual for implementing mental health promotion in schools; one for implementing mental health promotion in workplaces; and one for implementing mental health promotion in older people's residence.

The ProMenPol Database is a structured selection of Mental Health Promotion tools in three distinct settings: schools, workplace and older peoples' residence. Within these settings the associated Mental Health Promotion tools are structured according to a modification of the ICF Classification, ICD10 Classification and a categorisation based on Health Promotion models.

The ProMenPol partners will be very happy to receive feedback on the new online database and toolkit content. For this purpose, a specially designed online survey will be available and distributed soon.

Work. in tune with life. move europe - Official Opening of the new European Network for Workplace Health Promotion Campaign by the European Commission

On the 8th October 2009, the new European Network for Workplace Health Promotion (ENWHP) campaign was launched officially by the European Commission at the joint ProMenPol/ENWHP Conference in Berlin.

Under the slogan "work. in tune with life. move europe" the ENWHP campaign will address the growing problem of mental illness and continue the campaign by focussing on this issue. The objective of the 8th ENWHP initiative is to bring the attention of employers and employees to strategies and programmes that exist to promote mental health at the workplace and to help them recognise their own and colleagues' emotional problems at an early stage. As in the previous campaign, models of good practice in companies and administrations will be identified and guidelines will be produced for management and other stakeholders.

The campaign is now open for participation: companies will have the opportunity of finding out how mental health promotion can be part of their workplace health promotion programme. With their examples of good practice they can also become a "Move Europe Partner".

NEWS FROM MHE MEMBER ORGANISATIONS

Czech Association for Mental Health

One of the fundamental problems associated with psychiatric care in the Czech Republic is the issue of allocation of finances to and within the mental health field. Only 4 percent of the health care budget go to this field, whereas the norm in the EU is 5 to 8 percent. The Psychiatric Association has been lobbying for budgetary increases and holding seminars and conferences. One of its successes was to attract finances to the hospital sector as there is no other venue where the VZP (General Health Insurance company) can allocate money. Community care, sanatoria, and crisis centres fall in a grey zone between two ministries of health and social affairs, therefore their financing has not been established and patients suffer from this split.

An example of a successful project are the seminars Coopera which have been imported from Belgium. The aim of these seminars was to create a link between the therapist and the users incorporating family members as active participants. These seminars were positively received. The Czech Association for Mental Health has also participated at an international seminar on destigmatization that was held in Prague in May. Several contacts have been developed from there.

The largest psychiatric hospital, Bohnice, has a special unit, Bona, which has been established to facilitate the return of clients back to normal life as much as possible while maintaining respectable living conditions. They offer social rehabilitation and protected housing.

Annually, Bohnice holds a music, theatre and art festival on its grounds in order to promote connections between the healthy population and those who are clients of this hospital or elsewhere. It has become a successful endeavour, drawing thousands of people inside "the fence".

The Czech Ombudsman issued a report last year about the state of the mental health care in Czech psychiatric hospitals. Unfortunately, this report has not been reflected upon by the ministries and hospitals in question to this day.

The Czech Association for Mental Health is participating in a working group to develop a new law on mental health that is so far non-existent in the Czech Republic. The working group is led by the National Council for Persons with Disabilities.

UK Government's social care Green Paper overlooks mental health

On the day that the consultation period for the Government's Green Paper on adult social care closes, mental health charity Mind has expressed its concerns that the Paper does not address the needs of adults with mental health problems, instead skewing the debate towards older people.

Actually, since the Government first started the debate on future funding for social care in 2008, Mind has consulted people with mental distress about their experiences of care and support, and how this should be funded in the future.

II. EU INSTITUTIONS AND OTHER BODIES

Public Health Programme 2008-2013: calls for proposals 2010 already in 2009

The European Commission has just announced that it plans to publish the Work Plan for 2010, which sets the annual priorities for the implementation of the EU Health Programme already in 2009.

The calls for proposals for projects, operating grants, conferences and joint actions will be launched immediately after the Work Plan is published. Tentative deadline for submitting proposals is early March 2010.

UN Office of High Commissioner on Human Rights hosts expert meeting to debate the implementing and monitoring mechanisms of the UN Convention

On Monday 26 October, an expert panel meeting was organised by the Office of High Commissioner on Human Rights (OHCHR) in Geneva. The discussion was on article 33 of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) related to the national implementing and monitoring bodies. The expert panel meeting was part of the process that leads to a thematic study to be presented by the OHCHR to the Human Rights Council at its March session. The meeting was attended by about 50 participants, from States, national human rights institutions and disabled people organisations. The presentations underlined the challenges related to article 33. Article 33 includes 3 paragraphs among which paragraph 1 - focal point and coordination mechanism - refers to bodies within the Government, while paragraph 2 deals with monitoring structures which are independent from Government. In this regard, some interesting examples were given about the different ways States approached the paragraph 2 of article 33, like the examples of Germany and Spain. The Chair of the CRPD Committee informed participants that the CRPD Committee has agreed on the reporting guidelines, which will be available by mid November. These guidelines should include a section requesting information on the implementation of article 33.

Stronger protection for the rights of people with disabilities in the EU!

On 26 November, the EU Council of Ministers approved a decision for the EU to accede to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. This is the first time a regional organisation has acceded to a UN human rights convention. The Convention will provide a clear framework for improving protection and realising the rights of people with disabilities in the EU. The decision of the EU Council is an important step forward for EU human rights policy and a sign of the importance the EU assigns to the rights of people with disabilities.

The Convention was signed by the EU in March 2007 and is the first UN human rights convention that allows the possibility for regional organisations to accede. The Council decision means that the EU will present its formal accession instrument as soon as agreement has been reached in the EU on the institutional arrangements.

European Disability Forum on the seminar for the implementation of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

On 28 October 2009, the European Disability Forum (EDF) and the European Consortium of Foundations on Human Rights and Disability (EFC) organised a seminar in Brussels on the National Implementing and Monitoring Bodies described in Article 33 of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRDP). It aimed at exploring the obligations coming from the CRDP regarding the functions and the shaping of these bodies, as well as analysing how EU member States and EU Institutions are foreseeing the fulfilling of their obligations. The symposium brought together a wide range of experts from the United Nations and independent mechanisms in Germany, Spain and UK, European Commission officials, representatives of the European Parliament and a strong representation of national and European disability organizations. The discussions focused mainly on the issue of independence of the bodies as well as the participation for people with disabilities. The importance of the implication of civil society in the implementing body has been raised and considered as a major challenge in the creation of these bodies.

MHE was represented at this event by Roselyne Bourgon, Human Rights Officer.

Meeting of the "Ad hoc expert group on transition from Institutional to Community care", 18 November, Brussels

On 18 November, the Cabinet of the EU Commissioner Spidla held the last follow-up meeting of the "Ad hoc expert group on transition from institutional to community care". The representatives of the European Commission gave an overview of the report's dissemination process. The Report will be translated in all the EU languages and will be presented in various conferences during the next month. An official communication is on preparation in order to disseminate the results. During the meeting, it was also stressed that the Report should be endorsed by all the different ENGOs partners of the "Expert Group". The dissemination plan, together with the suggestions raised in the debate, will be rediscussed in a "final" meeting that will have place on the 16 December in Brussels. On this occasion, the possibility of maintaining the "Expert Group's" activities will also be considered.

Josée Van Remoortel represented MHE in the "Experts Group" and in its meeting.

European Court of Human Rights hears first social care institution case

On 10 November, the first case heard by the European Court of Human Rights deals with the segregation of hundreds of thousands of people labelled with intellectual disabilities, mental health problems and other types of disabilities. The two cases were argued before the European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg - Mitev v. Bulgaria and Stanev v. Bulgaria - and were both brought jointly by the nongovernmental organisations Bulgarian Helsinki Committee and the Mental Disability Advocacy Center. Mr Mitev died in a social care institution last year and his case was continued by his sister. My Stanev attended the Court hearing in person, becoming the first person from a social care institution to bring his case before European Court for Human Rights. In both cases, the applicants were deprived of legal capacity and placed under guardianship against their will. In their applications to the European Court of Human Rights, both applicants alleged, e.g. that the deprivation of legal capacity was done in such a way as to violate their right to a fair trial (in violation of Article 6 of the European Convention on Human Rights) and that the deprivation of legal capacity affected the enjoyment of their private and family life (Article 8).

The Bulgarian Helsinki Committee and the Mental Disability Advocacy Center called upon the Bulgarian government to issue an immediate moratorium to new admissions to social care institutions.

III. EY FOR COMBATING POVERTY AND SOCIAL EXCLUSION

The Year 2010 will be the European Year for Combating Poverty and Social Exclusion. The key objectives are to raise public awareness about these issues and renew the political commitment of the EU and its Member States to combat poverty and social exclusion. The EY 2010 aims to challenge stereotypes and collective perceptions of poverty to ensure everyone can play a full and active role in society.

MHE has created a new section in order to increase awareness about the link between mental health and poverty.

Research has shown clear links between mental health and poverty. People experiencing poverty are particularly vulnerable towards getting mental health problems, since due to financial hardship or not having a job frequently their social contacts are suffering and uncertainty about the future dominate their daily lives.

Eurobarometer Survey on Poverty and Social Exclusion 2009

On the occasion of the upcoming European Year for Combating Poverty and Social Exclusion, a Eurobarometer Survey had been launched. The survey questions included the perceived extent of poverty and perceived reasons for poverty in the EU member states. Poor health, long-term illness or disability was named by 18 % of the survey participants as one of the two most probable reasons for poverty, whereas 5 % mentioned mental health problems as a reason. People suffering from mental health problems were considered by 13 % as the group of population that is most at risk of poverty.

Flash Eurobarometer on "Monitoring the social impact of the crisis"

A Flash Eurobarometer on "Monitoring the social impact of the crisis: public perceptions in the European Union" has been carried out in July 2009 and published in October 2009. The aims of this Eurobarometer were to investigate perception about the existence of poverty and homelessness, to gain knowledge about the degree of financial difficulty of households (in the 12 months leading up to the survey) and the perceived job security and employment situation.

Other objective of the study were to measure the challenges in healthcare and social-care affordability in the past six months and to understand how people feel about their future pension entitlements and worries regarding income in old age.

A Disability Pact for Europe

The European Disability Forum (EDF) met in the Swedish capital to adopt the proposal for the European Disability Pact.

Sweden is a European leader in the promotion of human rights: the government ratified the United Nation Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) in December 2008, and the Swedish Presidency of the European Union is about to reach an agreement on the conclusion of the Convention by the European Community by the end of the year.

It is the first time in its history that the European Community will accede to an international human rights treaty. This ratification is a strong signal sent to the Member States both to implement the UNCRPD at a national level and to recognize disability as a cross cutting issue.

Such a political context implies a real need for coordinated actions. It is crucial for the European Commission to synchronize its disability strategy with Member States: the European Disability Pact is therefore the essential tool. Through the Pact, the Lisbon strategy will give new impetus to the social inclusion of persons with disabilities, recognizing disability as a cross cutting issue. The Pact will cover employment, social protection, education, growth and competitiveness, e-inclusion policies and research.

Report of the conference "Promotion of Mental Health and Well-being of Children and Young People– Making it happen" available online

Report on "Growth, Jobs and Social Progress in the EU - A contribution to the evaluation of the social dimension of the Lisbon Strategy"

The new report from the Social Protection Committee – which brings together experts from each EU country – outlines that the social protection systems have helped shield Europeans from the worst effects of the financial crisis. However, the conclusions of the report highlights that social protection alone is not enough to prevent poverty and exclusion, and stress the importance of goals such as fighting child poverty and promoting active inclusion. Indeed, further modernisation of social protection needs to be fully articulated with growth and jobs strategies.
